Enterprise Day – 16th January 2009

Enterprise Day is an annual event at Wallasey School designed to introduce year 10 students to the idea of creative problem solving and work related learning.

Volunteers from local businesses and Wirral Borough Council present real life business situations to students and see what ideas they come up with to solve them.

Along with these volunteers the students also get a chance to experience mental and physical challenges with the Army and also take part in a Work Experience Workshop. Where students find out more about their choice of placement.

One example led by the Wirral Housing Regeneration Unit, is the Empty House Project. They tasked the students, using photographs and plans, to come up with inventive practical ideas for the use of a three storey derelict house donated to the community.

Brilliant suggestions were made ranging from a recording studio through to a nursery and a homeless shelter! Bernie Quigley does a fantastic job of organising the event.

Wallasey School has recently been nominated for a Heartlands Award - 'Working with Partners' as a result of this work.

Heart Start is a national training programme funded by the British Heart Foundation. The aim is to train school staff to deliver Coronary Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training to school children.

To date Wallasey School has 6 staff trained to deliver the program and Phil Duffy, Headteacher, has set a target that every student is to be trained in CPR. The task started last term with our year 12 students. Thirteen of those not only achieved their Heart Start certificates but went on to pass their Young First Aiders Certificate. 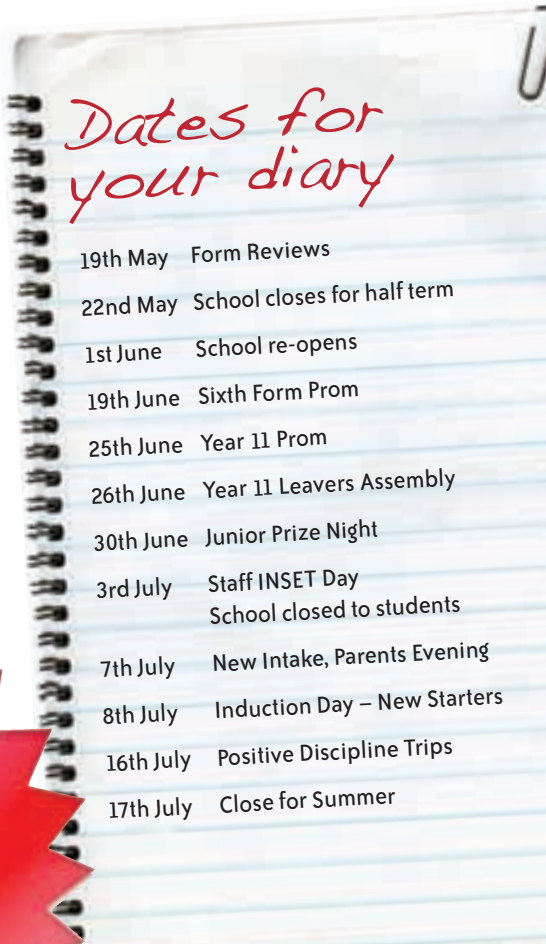
visits the School

It really was a stimulating and informative afternoon for both Angela and the students, Angela enjoyed it so much she invited the students down to London to visit her and the House of Commons.



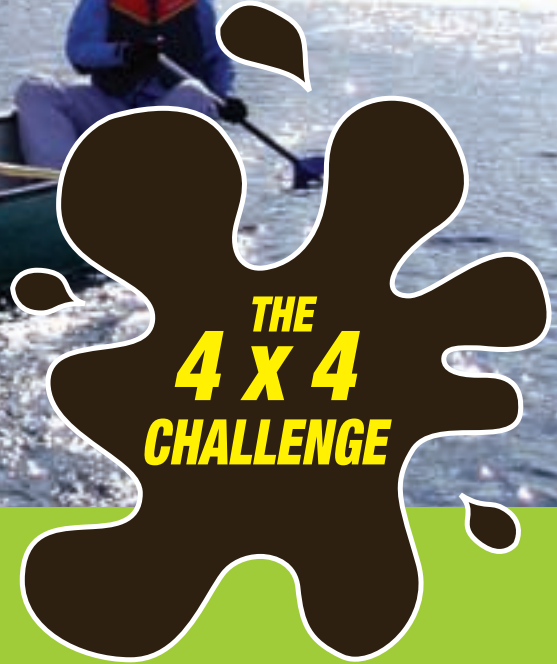

Irish Embassy to beg for an unexpected Visa, the challenge was upon us! The Easter holidays is usually a nice break for everyone but this year the school was still buzzing with activity as each team met and set off for their respective corners of our great nation. Every group would have its own specific problems that they hoped would not wreck their chances of success; **Team Ireland** hoped the sea would be crossable and their ferry wasn't delayed; **Team Wales** hoped they would suffer from minimal mechanical hitches and punctures; **Team Scotland** hoped the wind would be going from west to east and not against them, and **Team England** hoped to avoid the dreaded blisters!!!



At some point, every team did incur these problems but they all struggled through, battling against the elements and exhaustion, and at 6.55pm on Friday 10th April, each team had arrived back through the school gates and the 4x4 Challenge had been successfully completed! This was only part of the story though. **The whole reason for doing this was to raise money for Claire House, our local Children's Hospice.** Once we added up all our sponsorship and counted all our collected coppers our grand total stood at a whopping **£17,000!** A truly fantastic achievement!



All that remains is for me to say a huge thank you to everyone who donated money to our appeal, and a very special "**thank you**" to the people from the support teams who didn't get much of the glory and accolades but who made it possible for the competitors to actually take part in their events. I think we'll have a few years off now before the next challenge but don't worry, we'll be back and next time it'll be a truly global experience...

Jesus Christ Superstar

A Superstar Performance

When I accepted the invitation to attend the school's production of Jesus Christ Superstar, I'm not sure what I was expecting... a run of the mill school production? Some questionable costumes and average singing? Or even worse a collection of wanabees who all thought they were, well, actually superstars!

I have been to a few good school productions in my time – I've even appeared in a few, but never, did I expect to witness a performance, so powerful and well-executed it would actually make me cry!

To say the show was amazing is a massive understatement. From the moments the lights went up and the first bars of (totally live) music rang out across the packed hall, I was mesmerised.

It is hard to pick out particularly brilliant bits, or single out individuals for particular praise, as the whole thing worked together so beautifully.

The staging, costumes and lighting were subtle yet extremely effective, and the casting was a work of art.

David Bulley captured Jesus' tortured final days beautifully, combining his powerful voice and angelic manner to produce a perfect Jesus. Danielle O'Neill's Mary Magdalene displayed her characteristic warmth and total adoration of Jesus, with a simple yet powerful performance. Her rendition of 'I Don't Know How to Love Him' was spellbinding and very moving.

Michael Nelson's emotive portrayal of the tormented betrayer Judas, represented some of the nights most powerful performances. From anger, to grief and ultimately despair, every emotion was palpable and executed with utter passion.

He was matched in both energy and depth, and possibly outdone in sheer cheekiness by Jamie Eccleson who played loyal disciple Peter.

It's hard to single out a favourite performance, so my vote is split between the moody and

incredibly mature performance of Owain Pierce-Hayes who played Pilot and the sheer show stopping hysteria that was Herod played by Dean Osgood.

Wrap this up with a dash of evil menace from The Pharisees, a huge measure of unbridled talent from the loyal disciples and some wonderfully executed choreography from an extraordinarily gifted team of dancers – and you have the recipe for total genius.

My utmost respect and massive congratulations goes out to all involved, especially Mrs Dutfield, Mrs Rooney, Mrs Darker and Mrs Murphy for their energy, enthusiasm and drive – but it has to be the talent of all the schools dancers, singers, actors, musicians and back stage support that deserve the biggest cheer of all.

I salute you guys, you were great – you made me cry!

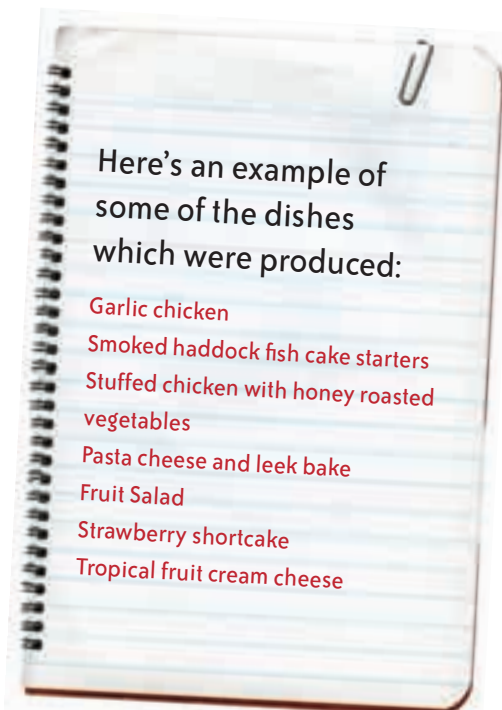
Andrew Lloyd Webber was only 23 when Jesus Christ Superstar was first performed in 1971.

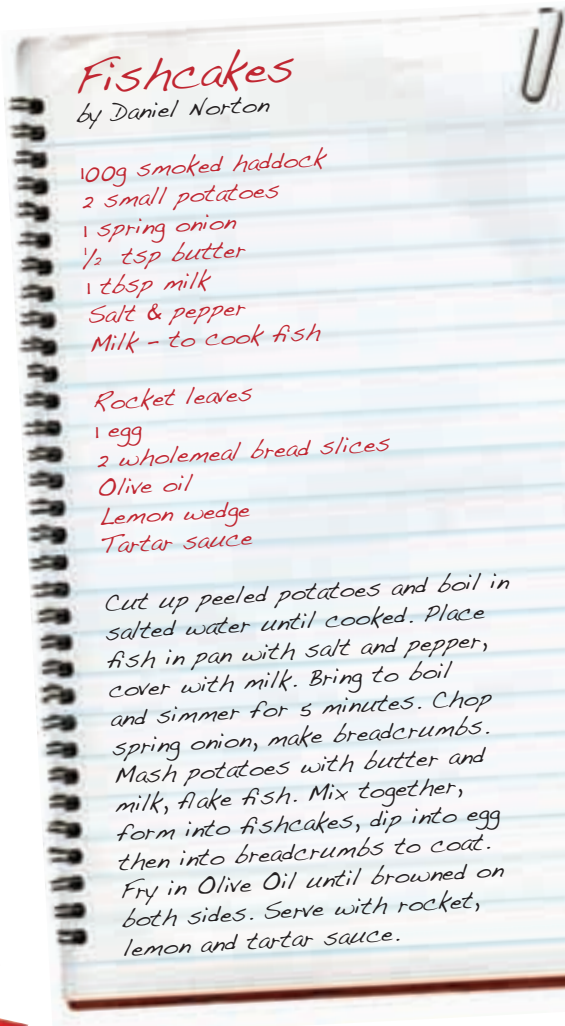

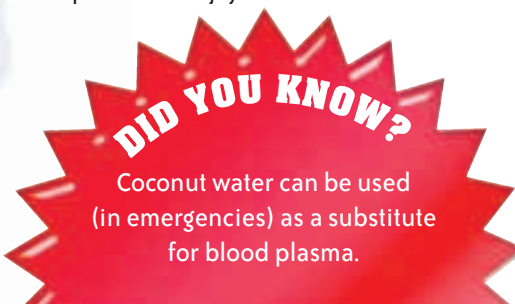
Fishcakes

- 100g smoked haddock
- 2 small potatoes
- 1 spring onion
- ½ tsp butter
- 1 tbs milk
- Salt & pepper
- Milk - to cook fish

- Rocket leaves
- 1 egg
- 2 wholemeal bread slices
- Olive oil
- Lemon wedge
- Tartar sauce

Cut up peeled potatoes and boil in salted water until cooked. Place fish in pan with salt and pepper, cover with milk. Bring to boil and simmer for 5 minutes. Chop spring onion, make breadcrumbs. Mash potatoes with butter and milk, flake fish. Mix together, form into fishcakes, dip into egg then into breadcrumbs to coat. Fry in Olive Oil until browned on both sides. Serve with rocket, lemon and tartar sauce.

7 Waves Community Radio – Not just a radio station

Pauline Murphy and her team over at 7 Waves Community Radio are helping Wallasey School students take an interest in broadcast media. They offer them a chance to see how a radio station really works, how adverts are made, the technology used and the opportunity to actually speak live on air!

The station itself has been on air since March 2008 and is going from strength to strength. The 'all mod cons' purpose built studio has been designed and built with training in mind. They have 3 'on air' studios and another 2 for production and mixing. There is a 32 track recording studio where students can 'lay down' their own music and find themselves producing the next Justin Timberlake hit.

The station also has a 'Live Room' where bands can come in to practice and perform. The Live Room comes complete with a mixing booth and the ability to play the session out live on air. Any of these facilities can be used by the public as well as youth and school groups.

Wirral Met College runs a Radio Training Programme in conjunction with 7 Waves and utilises the equipment. Courses last from one day through a full 12 week session.

On a Friday evening 7 Waves has a show called 'The Teen Team', it's hosted by Glynn Thomas and covers all kinds of topics from teenage pregnancy through to managing exam stress and looking at alternative medicines. Young people are invited to phone/text/email in with their problems and Glynn and his team will do their best to help them out.
